Father Allan's Reflections...

"Now there is rejoicing in heaven; for you were lost, and are found; you were dead, and are now alive in Christ Jesus our Lord."

From the Reconciliation of a Penitent, (BCP p 451)

Ah, the signs of springtime are returning to our glorious valley! Perhaps, too soon or perhaps, a "calm before the storm" as winter offers its last gasp with a whopper of a storm. Time will tell. Nevertheless, Lenten journeys have encouraged many to begin a "spiritual"

springtime: to see signs of new life and new growth within our hearts *and* our minds. In the words of that great Easter hymn, "Lent's long shadows have departed" – well, at least they are *starting* to depart. "Almost, but not quite" might be a more honest description of this particular time of year – a time that holds such great hope and promise even though winter still clings to the air.

"Almost, but not quite" is an apt description of our spiritual journeys, too. Our time of reflection throughout Lent is drawing to a close, the heartbreak of Holy Week is looming, as is the glorious promise of Easter. We know we have been forgiven and have the assurance of eternal life in Christ. And yet, there are times of doubt, times when we realize we're not quite there yet. Times when we recognize that God's work in us continues and yet, is far from complete. Sometimes we wonder, "Am I *really* forgiven? Will I *ever* get there?"

One of the most beautiful, strengthening, cleansing, encouraging but, underutilized sacraments of the Church is the *Rite of Reconciliation* (BCP pp 446-448). Some call it "Confession" but it really is much *more* than that. It is about assurance, about embracing God's grace and forgiveness. It is about claiming the Holy Week and Easter promises Christ offered us and the whole world at a great price. It is a gift that, sadly, often goes unopened. It is a gift that is especially meaningful as Lent ends and Eastertide looms.

As your Lenten journey draws to a close with all its questions about your worthiness before God, questions like: am I really forgiven, am I ever going to "get there," I invite you to let *Reconciliation* be a part of your Holy Week observance this year. There is nothing more powerful, comforting, and assuring than embracing with absolute certainty the words that conclude this rite, "Now, go in peace. The Lord *has* put away *all* your sins." Thanks be to God. (BCP 451)

The Beauty of Holy Week

The following is a "primer" on the rich beauty and diversity of Holy Week Worship Services. Come and encounter once again the redemptive grace of God retold and relived through stirring liturgies.

The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday (8:30 & 11:00 am)

Note: We gather in Skiles Hall for the Liturgy of the Palms and, with shouts of "Hosanna!" process together into the Church in commemoration of our Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The recitation of the Passion Story (St. Mark) concludes this stirring service.

Holy Wednesday (5:30 pm) - "Mary's Way of the Cross"

Our Daughters of the king present this unique remembrance of the Stations of the Cross offered from the perspective of Mary, the mother of our Lor.

Maundy Thursday (7:00 pm)

"Mandatum" (Latin for commandment) is the origin of the Maundy Thursday name. We hear St. John's account of the last supper and demonstrate the new commandment to love one another by washing each other's feet. (Wear hose and shoes that are easily removed.)

The Holy Eucharist follows and concludes with a solemn procession of the consecrated bread and wine to the Garden of Gethsemane (Skiles' Altar) where it will remain through Good Friday

Following the procession, the Sanctuary is stripped of all ornamentation. Every item that witnesses to the life of Christ is removed so that the building is empty, stark and lifeless. The altar is washed with vinegar and water (i.e., gall) as the kneeling congregation prays aloud Psalm 22. This is a very dramatic and spiritually enriching service.

Maundy Thursday Prayer Vigil (8:30 pm – Midnight)

A silent prayer vigil in observance of our Lord's time at Gethsemane begins at the conclusion of the Maundy Thursday service and continues through midnight. If you have not already done so, please sign up on the notice posted in Skiles Hall. The Prayer Vigil invites all to join with our Lord in prayer for the whole state of Christ's church and the world.

Good Friday (12:00 Noon)

We gather at 12 Noon to walk the traditional *Stations of the Cross* in commemoration of our Lord's journey to Golgotha and ultimate execution. This is a poignant devotional service whereby we behold and contemplate the wonder of our salvation wrought at so great a price.

The Solemn Liturgy of Good Friday (7:00 pm)

The Good Friday liturgy focuses on our Lord's death and yet, it is *not* a funeral service. Our ceremonial is stark, direct, powerful, and its meaning unmistakable. There is a marked simplicity to our liturgy as we contemplate St. John's account of the Crucifixion. A series of ancient prayers for the whole world are offered followed by biddings to silent prayer. The service reaches its climax when all gather to commune together from the reserved Sacrament of Maundy Thursday.

Holy Saturday (9:30 am)

A simple service of Morning Prayer with appropriate prayers and canticles is offered in the Chancel.






Observing a holy "Holy Week"

The observance of Holy Week is one of the great riches of the Christian Church. Sadly, some church traditions jump from Palm Sunday right to Easter Sunday (perhaps with a passing glance at Good Friday) and in so doing, miss out on the incredibly enriching journey of Holy Week.

In the Episcopal Church tradition, Holy Week is far *more* than a retelling of *past* events. Our liturgies invite us to be physically present in Jerusalem and watch the events of the world's salvation unfold before our very eyes as if for the first time. Episcopalians *don't simply recall* Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, we are there to *participate in it* and welcome Jesus into the city. We *don't simply remember* the Last Supper when our Lord washed the feet of all present, we, too, *are present* to wash each other's feet and share the bread and wine. We *don't just contemplate* Gethsemane, we go there and kneel in prayer with our Lord. *We see the crucifixion* for ourselves and, because we are present at the Tomb on that first Easter, we hear for our own selves the good news of the resurrection.

It has long been said one cannot fully comprehend the meaning of Easter without having walked the "Way of the Cross" with our Lord through the events of this most wondrous and holiest of weeks. To that end, Holy Cross offers a unique opportunity for God's people to gather together, to engage, to witness, and participate in our Lord's Passion in preparation for the celebration of his most glorious resurrection. *All are encouraged to be a part of the greatest story ever told.*





Bring a favorite bell and prepare to ring in, and proclaim, the resurrection of our Lord! Glorious music, bells, and joyful shouts of "Alleluia Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed" resound as God's people gather to offer the Holy Eucharist with royal pomp and splendor in celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Tom Eshelman, former Director of the Valle Crucis Conference Center, did an amazing job of cataloging the history and photographs of the Valle Crucis Mission School. Tom shared with me some information he had received about Ida Ten Eyek O'Keefe who was an art teacher at the Mission School during the 1930's. (And yes, she was the sister of Georgia O'Keefe!) Some of us had heard a story that there was a mural that had been painted on a wall in one of the Mission School buildings. Tom had been over every inch of wall space in the buildings but no mural! The information Tom received was an article from the Charlotte News (circa 1934) and copies of photographs of "The Mural". It turns out that the mural was 200 feet by 3 feet and was evidently painted on about 14 pieces of canvas! The mural depicts the history of Valle Crucis Mission from Daniel Boone, Asa Gray the botanist, Valle Crucis Abbey, the Indians, the school teacher at the Mission who fell in love with the miller and married him, mobilizing for the Civil War to the Valle Crucis Mission Church! There were also some photos of the corn husk dolls made by children in the first grade at the Mission School. And a photograph of original designs painted on furniture by students in the fourth grade in 1934. No one knows what happened to the mural but we do have copies of the photos in the Ives Log Cabin so please stop by the cabin to look at these amazing photos! Below are excerpts from the newspaper article.

America Tired of French Art, Avows Teacher Miss Ida Ten Eyck O'Keerfe, Art Teacher, Here From Her Valle Crucis Studio

"American people are tired of the French influence in their art. They want to see the genuine American influence now. And just as the middle west has built up a tradition of modern art for itself, so can the south." It was Miss Ida Ten Eyck O'Keefe, art teacher and painter of murals from Valle Crucis, who made that statement here in Charlotte, where she had come to see the famous Samuel H. Kress collection of Italian paintings at the Charlotte Woman's club. Miss O'Keefe is herself a distinguished artist and is the sister of Georgia O'Keefe of New York, whose canvasses have won her the distinction of being one of the foremost of modern American artists and one whose work is in demand at all the modern galleries. At Valle Crucis here in North Carolina Miss Ida O'Keefe has been studying the folk background and traditions of the state and then translating them into the realm of art. What Professor F.H. Koch at Chapel Hill has done in folk drama, Lamar Stringfield in folk music and Richard Chase in folk dance, Miss O'Keefe is doing in painting. The murals she has already painted for the Valle Crucis Abbey picture the early Indians in North Carolina, the wild life and the flowers, then later scenes of the folk history of the community. "In Charlotte there are events and objects equally as interesting," she said. "Recently the Midwest has come to the forefront in art through such painters as Grant Wood and Curry. Since the depression America has paid much more attention to art and its artists than ever before, and the government has even started to encourage art. Now it is time for the south to make itself known as an art center." Miss O'Keefe was especially interested in the Mint Art Museum in Eastover, which she visited with Mrs. Harold C. Dwelle. "This museum should be made a center of art activities for the south," she declared. "With it as a starting point, you could develop a wonderful native art, encourage the genius in the community and begin to build up an art reputation like that now possessed by the Midwest." Discussing the new interest in art, Miss O'Keefe pointed out that even commercial objects were being made more beautiful and artistic. "In New York," she said, "the people are demanding that their spoons and pots and pans be artistic. And if the south does not develop artistically and culturally, soon the manufactured objects refused by people in such centers as New York because they are ugly will simply be dumped into the south. Art education through the Museum would be of great value in teaching the community to value beauty."

Thoughtful March greetings to one and all! As we journey through the season of Lent, we enter a "month of many colors". We begin the month in Lent, traverse all of Holy Week, and land in Easter! Here are the musical highlights to note at our upcoming March services.

Sunday, March 3 brings our Holy Cross Handbell Choir as we play the Offertory anthem that day. The music is a meditative setting of a familiar Lenten hymn, *Beneath the Cross of Jesus*. Terry Kirkland arranged this traditional hymn for two octaves of bells. The first verse features the melody in the upper notes, while the second verse elongates the melody and shifts it between the lowest bells and the inner voices. A simple ostinato accompanies the melody to complete the hymn and set the tone for contemplation. This hymn appears as #498 in our 1982 Hymnal.

Sunday, March 10 marks the arrival of an anthem originally scheduled for January 21: *Bless the Lord, O My Soul* by Mikhail Ippolitof-Ivanov. Here, the composer brilliantly captures the tight harmonies, rhythms, and musical movements of Russian Orthodox church music in a choral setting of Psalm 103. [Note that services on January 21 were cancelled due to snow/ice.]

March 17 is both the fifth Sunday in Lent and St. Patrick's Day! We debut a new anthem, *Hymn of St. Patrick* by Dwight Beal. This paraphrase of the *Prayer of St. Patrick* offers a contemporary setting with Celtic music influences. The piece begins in the key of D minor, transitions to F Major; then returns to the D minor theme. The anthem creates a very solid and appealing adaptation of the text, for which the composer generously provided free scores! He had a simple request: that the music be encouraged for inclusion in the CCLI listing (Christian Copyright Licensing International). I was happy to honor that call, and guess what? CCLI is now reaching out to him! We are in for an Irish musical treat on this special Sunday!

March 24 begins Holy Week with Palm Sunday and the anthem, *Hosanna to the Son of David*. This traditional opening antiphon for the day is composed by Tomás Luis de Victoria, a master of Renaissance polyphony. The antiphon, a brief sentence from scripture (Mark 11:9-10), sets the stage for the liturgical moment of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The composer intricately weaves the SATB voices together in a seamless fashion. Each part develops from a prior entrance, with texts presented at different times and in various rhythms before culminating in a grand cadence.

Maundy Thursday occurs on March 28. The Offertory this evening is a seldom-sung hymn, You Laid Aside Your Rightful Reputation (WLP #734). Contemporary English poet, Rosalind Brown, penned the text. The music was written by Charles Hubert Hastings Parry. A well-known British music scholar and composer, Parry was an influential teacher of several musical elite, including R. Vaughan Williams, Host, and Elgar. He passed away in 1918, a victim of the Spanish flu pandemic. This hymn marries a Maundy Thursday text (Jesus' command to love and serve), with a carefully crafted tune. The chordal structure and melody are reminiscent of Johann Sebastian Bach, whom Parry studied thoroughly.

March 29 is Good Friday and the choral anthem brings an updated version of a famous hymn with Gregg Sewell's *O Sacred Head Now Wounded*. This reflective setting begins with a series of ever-ascending melodic intervals. This gentle uplifting points toward a secure faith, despite a very difficult text. Accompanied by rich, flowing harmonies, the music conveys assurance and peace—a vital message for this solemn day when God chose to save us from our sins.

Easter Sunday finally arrives on March 31 and we celebrate at both 8:30 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. with full Choir, Brass, and Organ! The Offertory on this joyful day is *Good Christians All*, *Rejoice and Sing* arranged by Robert A. Benson. This quintessential anthem of Easter celebration is enhanced by energetic brass parts in dialogue with the Choir and organ. Once again, we are blessed to welcome an All-Faculty Brass from ASU: Dr. James Stokes (trumpet), Mr. Brent Bingham (trumpet), and Dr. Joseph Brown (trombone)!

March brings hope, renewal, and peace. May you feel God's presence within you, beside you, beneath you, and above you.
